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

CORONATION FLOWERS

Most people will by now have seen the exquisite Coronation invitation even if they haven't received one!

This beautiful piece of artwork was created by Andrew Jamieson, an heraldic artist and manuscript illustrator, who kept the commission secret even from his own family. The borders reflect the King's passion for the environment, inspired by a British wild flower meadow, with tiny depictions of bluebells, cornflowers, lily of the valley, dog roses and wild strawberries, with a sprig of rosemary which signifies remembrance. The borders reflect the appearance of the 'flowery meads' often pictured in medieval and Renaissance illuminated manuscripts and tapestries. All of these flowers have meanings in the Victorian Language of Flowers of which the King's forbear, Queen Victoria, was a great fan.

Grouped in threes, the flowers symbolise that King Charles is the third monarch of that name. Also to be seen are the four floral emblems of the nations of the UK.

Amongst the flowers can be spotted favourite creatures such as a wren, robin, butterfly, bee and ladybird. The lion, unicorn and boar also found amongst the wild flowers reflect their Majesties' coats of arms.

At the foot of the invitation is a depiction of the Green Man. The Green Man is a figure of British folklore generally taken to represent growth and rebirth. The Green Man, crowned with natural foliage is composed of leaves from oak, hawthorn, ivy and the floral emblems of the United Kingdom. The Green Man can often be seen carved in the roofs and over doorways of medieval churches and may originally have been of pagan origin.

At the time of writing the flowers to decorate the Coronation ceremony are unknown, but speculations include delphiniums, one of the King's favourite blooms and lily of the valley which featured in our late Queen's Coronation bouquet and which was a favourite of Queen Victoria. Some sources think that bluebells might be included and even flowers from the King's garden at Highgrove. Queen Camilla's favourite flower is said to be Alchemilla mollis, or Lady's Mantle, with its sweet scent and tiny green-yellow blooms. See which flowers you can identify on the great day itself.

WILDLIFE TO SEE IN MAY

In May you can hear the dawn chorus at its very best - if you wake up in time! You really need to be up around 5.00am to listen to the wrens, robins, tits, thrushes, blackcaps and if you are lucky, even nightingales. While you are out listening you might even spot one or two of the few turtle doves to be seen in England between May and September. They are comparatively rare now and mainly seen in eastern and southern England in hedgerows, scrub and woodland edges.

In recent editions of the Shipdham News the importance of the north Norfolk coast for migrating birds has been mentioned. This coast forms part of what is known as the East Atlantic Flyway, which stretches from Canada and Siberia through Western Europe and West Africa. Parts of East Anglia in Norfolk, Lincolnshire and Essex all form part of this migratory route which includes areas such as Snettisham where thousands of migratory birds breed every year. The flyway has been added to Britain's list of potential sites to be considered for UNESCO World Heritage status.

Dormice are awakening now having spent the winter tucked up in tiny woven nests and will forage for food such as honeysuckle, brambles and hawthorn. The tiny pygmy shrew is also awake now, weighing in at only 6 grams and consuming one and a quarter times it's own body weight each day in insects and spiders.

Butterflies and moths should be plentiful during May but some have been hard hit by the recent vagaries of the weather and we can only hope that this spring and summer will be kind to them with optimum conditions for feeding and breeding. The lime hawk moth is a distinctive one to look out for. It has scalloped wings and does not feed at all once it has turned into an adult moth. While this creature does

not feed others such as the redtailed bumblebee will be grateful if you spare some of your weeds; they love to feed on thistles, daisies, dandelions and clover. So leave a few in odd corners of your garden.

Bumble Bee Fuzzy yellow jacket, silky silver wings, buzz from shrub to flower, a welcome sight each spring.

There will be extra ringing to celebrate the Coronation weekend of 6th—8th May, with ringing planned each day. On the Saturday we plan to ring with our new recruits who have been busy learning to ring over the last few months to be ready in time. They are all doing well and on target for the special ringing. On the Sunday afternoon we will be attempting a Quarter Peal, which will be around 1260 changes taking about 45 minutes to complete. Then on the Bank Holiday Monday we will be attempting a Full Peal involving 5040 changes, taking just under 3 hours. This will be scheduled to finish before the start of the village 'Picnic in the Park'. Please do come along and listen to some of the ringing from the Churchyard, Pub Garden or wherever you feel comfortable! If you are reading this and feel you would like to find out what ringing is all about and what we get up to, come along and see us in

the tower on a Wednesday evening from 7pm. You will be made very welcome and can even have a go!




Really Useful Sale

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THE FENS

The Fens stretch over a huge area of East Anglia, covering parts of Norfolk, Suffolk, Lincolnshire and Cambridgeshire. Their extent is about 1,500 square miles. The rivers Ouse, Nen, Welland and Witham flow across the region flowing into the Wash between Norfolk and Lincolnshire.

The word fen is a local term signifying the type of marshland which is found in this area. The water is generally alkaline or neutral and contains large amounts of minerals which have gradually dissolved into it. The area formed a basin which gradually became filled in with sediment and parts of the area formed beds of peat ranging in depth from just a few inches to ten feet. Essentially the area is a flood plane over clay, with some slightly higher areas or 'islands', on one of which Ely stands. The lowest land point in Britain lies within the Fens - Holme Fen in Cambridgeshire lies nearly 3 metres below sea level!

In recent years settlement from the ancient past covered by peat deposits have been revealed after periods of drought exposed them. The Romans cultivated large areas but later during Anglo-Saxon times the Fens were very sparsely populated. During the Middle Ages some areas were reclaimed to facilitate the development of farming, but from the mid 17th century the Fens began to be drained much more extensively and purposefully in the area known as the Bedford Level. The drains which were created helped increase the fertility and crop producing ability of the Fens but also cause further sinking of the peatlands. Windmills and steam pumping engines followed by diesel engines have all been used to control the level of water in more recent times, but flooding is a constant worry with road signage in the area indicating flood escape routes. The novel The Nine Tailors (published 1934) by Dorothy L. Sayers has graphic descriptions of a fictional breach of the drains and the disastrous consequences.

Today the Fens are farmed extensively for wheat, but also for vegetables, fruit and flowers. Many of us will have enjoyed driving through the Fens when the daffodil and tulip bulb fields have been in full bloom. The Fens are very rich agricultural land and here may be found about half of the most fertile land in England. There are still some areas of peat surviving, some of which are nature reserves providing opportunities for the study of rare insects and plants. As well as agricultural land the Fens are home to churches and cathedrals such as Ely and Peterborough and King's Lynn, Boston and

Cambridge all lie within the area designated as the Fens.



CORONATION CELEBRATIONS

For those readers who are too young to have ever seen, let alone use, a blue bag, it was customary to use a blue bag in the final rinse on laundry day (almost always Monday). Made by Reckitt & Colman the small blue bag contained synthetic

ultramarine and baking soda which whitened sheets. It was used in wash-houses throughout the world including the royal laundries.

The packaging of the blue bag was red, white and blue and is probably the reason why young Graham Head's costume was chosen. Blue bag was also used to treat bee stings whereas vinegar was the old cure for wasp stings.



CORONATION CHICKEN

Created in 1953 in honour of the new Queen, this recipe was inspired by renowned mid-century florist Constance Spry(1996-1960), and cordon bleu chef Rosemary Hume(1907-1984) who catered for a celebration banquet for Elizabeth II. 'Poulet Reine Elizabeth', known commonly as 'Coronation Chicken' is believed to have been inspired by the 'Jubilee Chicken' created for the Silver Jubilee of George V in 1935.

The three official recipes for our new King are: Ken Hom's 'Coronation Roast Rack of Lamb with Asian-style Marinade', Nadiya Hussain's 'Coronation Aubergine', and Adam Handling's 'Strawberry and Ginger Trifle'.

This brings us nicely back to 2023 and we wish everyone a happy coronation holiday.



SHIPDHAM TWINNING

This is the time of year when the Parish Council SHIPDHAM TWINNING ASSOCIATION invites reports from each village organisation. Here's (a slightly edited version of) the Shipdham Twinning year:



'We hosted a visit from our French friends in May 2022, which was the first exchange visit since 2019, with a gap of some 3 years following the Covid pandemic. It was a successful and joyous reunion with 23 visitors and 33 Twinning Association members, a total of 56. We used Bullock Park pavilion to welcome our French friends which is just big enough to get us all in standing up but has the advantage of a car park that can accommodate the visitors' coach and the cars that take them off for an entertaining weekend. 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GARDENING TIPS

May is a really exciting month in the garden, when the daffodils which heralded spring are over and everything else is bursting into new growth. Spring flowering shrubs such as choisya, ribes and Japanese quince can be trimmed back now. Look for frost damage in evergreens and cut out, and check for shoots in variegated shrubs which have reverted to green and prune out. Clematis montana with its prolific growth can get very congested and will benefit from a vigorous prune as well. When pruning shrubs and trees check for birds' nests first as the breeding season is in full swing now.

Lawns are growing rapidly now. They will benefit from a weekly mow and bare patches can be reseeded in early May. You might want to think about giving an area of your lawn over to long grass - perhaps behind a shed or other inconspicuous area. Even a tiny area will make a difference and benefit all kinds of wildlife. There is much enjoyment to be had selecting bedding plants, but beware of putting out too early. There can still be frosts in May. Remember to feed your hanging baskets and container plants around every fourth week. If your baskets are subject to shady conditions try Busy Lizzies as they tolerate shade well. White flowered ones will really brighten up a dark corner.

In rural areas roses are far more likely to suffer from black spot than in urban ones; apparently town pollution reduces black spot so keep an eye out for this and for greenfly, particularly on roses, although this pest will suddenly appear on a large range of plants. Greenfly also especially love lupins. The old soapy water recipe is still one of the most effective ways of getting rid of this pest, using a mild solution of washing up liquid and water.

Now the ground has warmed, up perennials will put on a growth spurt. Encourage them by mulching while they are still small enough to get between and place supports, if not already done, for those tall enough to flop over or liable to wind rock. Try popping sweet peas in any odd spaces where they can be squeezed between other plants. As long as they can find something to climb they will delight for weeks with their sweet scent and glorious colours. Plug plants are a good idea if you haven't the time or inclination to sow and prick out flower or vegetable seedlings. You can bring them on in your greenhouse if you have one until, the weather is mild enough to plant them out. In the vegetable garden you can now be sowing chard and beetroot, sweetcorn, cucumber, courgettes, runner and French beans and of course Brussels sprouts.

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Report on the Club's meeting at the WI Hall. Thursday, 6th April 2023.

For the Club's April meeting we were given a demonstration and talk by club member Phill Webdale on how to present and show

exhibits in some categories at shows, such as the one we have at our **Anniversary Celebration Day on 5th August**. The Show Schedule for this has now been finalised.

Our visit to a National Garden Scheme venue was discussed and it was decided to have two trips this Summer. They are to be:

Sunday, 25th June to the Old Manor Farmhouse in Swanton Abbott, and Sunday, 30th July to The Long Barn in Newton Flotman.

We will meet at the WI Hall ready for cars to leave at 1.00pm on both of those days.

RHS Recognition Award for 2022

This is for societies to consider giving to someone who has helped to keep their club going and Lesley, as Chair, has decided to present it this year to Pete Sargent for being "our loyal and efficient treasurer for many years". At every committee meeting he presents up-to-date accounts to show exactly where we are financially.



As at the meeting we were judging our tulip competition, Phill started with how they are judged under RHS rules. He explained that they are marked out of 20 points; four points for condition, four for form (is it bolt upright, is it open so that you can see the stamens and anthers inside, is it peeling over), four for colour (is it true to the variety or faded), two for size (is it correct for the variety or stunted), three for substance and three for stems and foliage (does it have nicks, damage or any blemishes). Judges will sometimes hold the exhibit up to a bright light to see if there are any splits in the petals... but they cannot touch the exhibit, only the pot it is in.

Daffodils are marked out of 10 under RHS guidelines which takes into account that tulips are considered 'twice as difficult' to grow. A thing to remember with tulips is the rule of six. There should be six petals, and six anthers.

The winner entry was Paul Blanchette's (pictured with his entry, centre). His 'secret' was potting his bulb up in Bonsai soil!

Phill handed out some dahlia plants, grown from seed set in February, which were for members to grow on for judging at the August show. He gave some instructions as to how best to grown them on, keeping them protected from frost (as this would blacken and kill them), feeding and watering well, potting on up to a maximum sized pot of 10 litres and, importantly, pinching out the tips to encourage flowering shoots to grow. He also said that, as the time taken from pinching until a flower spike, is 70 days that, working backwards, anything pinched out after 29th May will not flower before the 5th August show!



We were then shown a simply way to show a 'flower floating in a bowl'. If you have a rose exhibit of which the leaves or petals aren't in great shape, just cut off the flower completely and position it in a bowl of water. Just one single good bloom is required. The head can't touch the sides of the bowl, so the right size bowl is needed.

Roses... There are three different stages of bloom that are looked for in an exhibit: the bud stage (which is where you can't see into the middle); the bloom that's gone over (so you can see all the stamens); and what they look for which is called the 'perfect rose' where a few of the petals are open, but the centre three or four are still closed covering the stamen. There is only a three day window when a rose is in this state.

Foliage exhibits... Dead or damaged leaves need to be removed, as well as any other leaves that make the exhibit look unbalanced.

Potted exhibits... Even though pots themselves aren't judged, if there were two identical exhibits, but one was in a damaged, water-stained or dirty pot (or one with a label still on it), it would be placed second. A quick (cheats) way of quickly covering that without having to repot the entry is to put the 'dirty' pot inside a slightly larger, clean one, and then spread gravel over the top.

Vase exhibits... The correct sized vases should be chosen as too small or too large a vase will detract from the exhibit. Oasis is banned by the RHS (as is contains plastic) so, to make a single stem exhibit stand up, newspaper or moss wrapped around the stem and pushed below the rim of the vase will do the job. Multi bloom exhibits should face in the same direction, with the back ones slightly higher (but not touching). Daffodils can be 'twisted' to get the heads pointing to the 12 o'clock position.

HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Herbaceous perennial exhibits... These need to be set out to give some impact. So 'a vase of foliage' can have as many stems as you can fit in the vase, trimmed to be the same level, with any damaged bits removed and tidied up.

Vegetable and fruit classes... When washing and preparing items, if you use a piece of black cloth, any blemishes will show up better, so sorting what to use will be easier.

Fruit is best presented on a plate as it keeps items together. Depending on the size of the vegetables, those with long roots for example, they may be better placed directly onto the table, rather than looking wrong overhanging the edge of a plate. Very importantly, if the class says '5 of' make sure there are 5 presented.

Photographs... Ensure the picture reflects the subject, and that it is a good quality image.

Preserves... Present in a clean jar with a little bit of an air gap at the top. The item should be labelled with, ideally, the ingredients listed.
