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
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#### **SHIPDHAM COMMUNITY CHOIR**

If you are able to help raise some money towards this, please contact a member of the PCC. Thank you.

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
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



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#### **NORFOLK SHIPWRECKS**

Recently items relating to the Gloucester ship, wrecked off the Norfolk coast on a sandbank in 1682, have been on show in Norwich. Sometimes referred to as Norfolk's 'Mary Rose', referring to the 16th century ship displayed at Portsmouth, the Gloucester remained hidden beneath the waves, its precise location unknown until recently. Found in 2007, the finding of the ship was not made public until 2022!

The ship was carrying the future King James 11 when it foundered, with a loss of up to 250 lives. James was one of the few to be saved.

Many other ships have unfortunately been wrecked off our Norfolk coast, including HMS Invincible launched in 1765, which saw action at the famous Cape St. Vincent battle in 1780 and several other such engagements. It foundered at Hammond's Knoll, a sandbank six miles out to sea off Happisburgh, in 1801, during the Napoleonic wars with the loss of 400 lives. There is a mass grave at Happisburgh commemorating the event.

On Hunstanton beach can be seen part of the wreck of the steam trawler Sheraton, launched in 1907. It saw service in both world wars, being used in boom defence in the First World War and as a patrol vessel during the Second World War. It then became a vessel used for target practice and was wrecked in 1947 when it drifted onto Hunstanton beach in a gale. Today it serves as a home for many marine creatures!

These are some of the better known Norfolk shipwrecks, but the there are unfortunately many more, such as the Galatea, a three masted cargo ship built in Glasgow and launched in 1884. While en route to Sydney from Hamburg the ship ran aground. Three Yarmouth tugs tried to refloat the ship but failed and she was then looted by French and English fishermen, much of her cargo ending up in Yarmouth and Lowestoft where the British fishermen lived!

Many shipwreck sites have been recorded by Norfolk Wreck Research and you can find out more on www.norfolkwreckresearch.co.uk but undoubtedly there are

many more wrecks yet to be discovered.


From the Friends of Dereham Memorial Hall-

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#### WILDLIFE TO SEE THIS MONTH


Look out for waxwings this month. These beautiful birds are winter visitors from Scandinavia, when there is not enough food in their own home environment. When large flocks appear it is known as a 'waxwing year'. They are often spotted feeding on rowan berries.

Watch out as you pass through the countryside for other winter visitors such as fieldfares and redwings - migrants from the Continent which overwinter here. They can often be seen feeding on farmland in loose flocks which may number between 10 and 200 individuals and may include starlings, blackbirds and thrushes.

Spectacular flocks of waders abound along the North Norfolk coast and the skies are adorned by huge sweeping flocks of lapwings and wading birds. Along the coast grey seals can be seen in abundance at sites such as Horsey, mating and producing offspring until as late as February. Blakeney Point is also a prime place for seeing seals.

Good news regarding England's most rare amphibian! The northern pool frog which disappeared from our nearby Thompson Common during the 1990s was successfully re-introduced there recently and funding from Natural England is making it possible to restore ice age ponds (known as ghost pingos) which make perfect habitats for this species. If you take a walk in the area you might be lucky and spot a rare frog or two. Acquiring this land will make it possible to create/ restore a new tapestry of habitats for wildlife.

Another good piece of news is that The Fens East Peat Partnership has been awarded more than £5m towards restoring our peatlands. A massive 87% of England's peatlands are seriously degraded. Restoring these peatlands will help protect wildlife and reduce the risk of flooding.

#### **ALL SAINTS' DAY**

All Saints' Day, also known as All Hallows' Day, is a Christian memorial day observed on November 1st in Western Christianity, celebrating the honour of all church saints. All Saints' Day is part of a broader tradition that includes All Hallows' Eve (Halloween) on October 31st and All Souls' Day on November 2nd.

The origin of All Saints' Day can be traced back to the early Christian Church when it was established as a day to remember and celebrate the martyrs and other saints who had died for their faith. Over time, it expanded to include martyrs and all faithful Christians who had lived pious and virtuous lives. It is a day to recognize the saints' collective witness and express gratitude for their example. In the early Christian Church, there was a strong emphasis on the veneration of martyrs who had suffered and died for their faith. These martyrs were seen as exemplary models of Christian virtue, and their graves or burial places became sites of pilgrimage and veneration. The anniversary of a martyr's death often became a day for commemorating their lives and the sacrifices they made for their faith.

In the Western Christian Church, Pope Gregory III (731-741) is often credited with establishing November 1st as the date for All Saints' Day. This date was chosen to coincide with the dedication of a chapel in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome to "All the Saints." It was an attempt to unify the various local celebrations of saints' feast days and set a universal date for honouring all the saints, something that Pope Boniface III had begun in 607 when the Pantheon was gifted to him by Emperor Phocas. Boniface III removed the old statues of Jupiter and the pagan gods and the Pantheon was dedicated to all the saints who had died from Roman persecution in the first 300 years after Christ. People prepared for the celebration with a night of vigil on Hallows' Eve -- Halloween (possibly because of the strong holdover influence of the Celtic Samhain festival, which many Christians in Ireland, Britain, Scotland, and Wales had continued to observe). Thus, "Halloween" (by that name) started out as a holy Christian celebration. Hallow, in Old English, means "holy" or "sacred." Therefore, "Hallows' Eve," or "Halloween," simply means "the evening of holy persons" and refers to the evening before All Saints Day, November 1.

There's a hymn that's traditionally sung around this time called "For All the Saints." It encourages believers to look back through the years of Christian history and think of the millions now enjoying rest and salvation in the presence of God. It's also meant to encourage believers here and now to press on, looking forward to the glorious day...

"...when the strife is fierce, the warfare long, Steals on the ear the distant triumph song, And hearts are brave again, and arms are strong. Alleluia, Alleluia!"

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#### SHIPDHAM TWINNING ASSOCIATION

Twinning can be catching. Our French friends also twin with Germany (before Shipdham came together with Noyant-la Gravoyére) and Hungary (after Shipdham). A contingent of the German twinning joined us when our French friends came over here



and a contingent of Shipdham went to Germany. For various reasons we couldn't go the 'whole hog' with a separate twinning but both were warmly received gestures on both sides. We took part in a parade with flags and they apologised for giving us the flag of St George rather than the Union Jack! How would they know? However, they had found out but it was too late to find a replacement. We didn't mind, of course, it's the thought that counts. When Hungary followed their twinning with France by twinning with Germany, a contingent from Shipdham were invited to Hungary. In the current times of conflict, it's good to have an excuse to join together in friendship across borders and ages. Twinning can only be a force for good. Come and join us!

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#### **FAYOURITE FLOWER—NERINE**

The Nerine sometimes seems incongruously cheerful when seen flowering during some of the drabbest moments of the year! Nerine symbolises love and devotion, strength and resilience.

The blooms appear on naked stems. The plant belongs to the Amaryllidacae family which also includes agapanthus and daffodil. Many Nerine cultivars are tender and need winter protection but Nerine bowdenii is fully hardy and is the one that you can often see blooming now. It also makes a good cut flower. This fully hardy cultivar can be planted in the ground but the bulbs of more tender cultivars, blooming earlier in the year, are best planted in pots and can be moved under cover or into the greenhouse as the weather gets colder.

Native to the rugged and dry landscape of South Africa the Nerine was first mentioned in 1635 by a French botanist who observed it in a garden the previous year. The next known reference dates to 1680 when there was a reference to a ship carrying the bulbs being wrecked. This is said to have occurred off Guernsey, the boxes of bulbs being washed up there. The plant has been growing wild there for some 350 years and it is sometimes known as the Guernsey Lily, although in fact it does not belong to that plant family.

The genus name Nerine was given to the plant by the plantsman William Herbert in 1820 and refers to the sea nymphs or Nereids of Ancient Greek myths, who protected voyagers from ill. The nereids were the daughters of the Old Man of the Sea, Nereus and lived with him at the bottom of the sea in a silvery grotto. The name was given to the plant as a reference to the shipwreck already mentioned.

Breeding and hybridisation of Nerine dates from the early 19th century and the work of the plantsman William Herbert, already mentioned. Nerine bowdenii, the cultivar adorning our gardens just now was introduced to Britain in the late 19th century and became an established plant for ornamental purposes early in the 20th century.

Currently Nerines have no known medicinal or magical uses but are widely grown commercially as cut flowers and ornamental garden and greenhouse plants.



#### SHIPDHAM HISTORY GROUP

The time of year comes upon us again to remember those service men and women who served, and those who lost their lives, in both world wars and later conflict. In 2018 our World War I research culminated in a book about the village from 1908-1922 and all those who lost their lives in that terrible war. There are few people remaining now to share their memories but we are still collecting information about residents who served in World War II but their families deserve to know more about the village during the late 1930s and 40s and to know who their loved ones served alongside.

You will note from the War Memorial in the churchyard of All Saints that Bernard Wilkins name is inscribed thereon. We are delighted to be meeting soon with Bernard's great niece who wishes to share his life history with us. She attended the remembrance service before covid lockdowns and laid a wreath for Bernard. This year we will be laying a wreath to remember all those local service personnel who died in both world wars.



#### SHIPDHAM'S VICTORIA CROSS RECIPIENT

Breckland's only recipient of the Victoria Cross medal during World War I was Arthur Henry Cross, after whom Henry Cross Close is named. He is one of many soldiers and sailors of the period about whom we have found much more information and photographs from his family since 2018. Our research never ceases, and our collection continues to grow. We hope one day to have suitable premises in Shipdham in which to share our expanding collection of historical items with residents past and present.



Cpl Arthur Henry Cross (known as Harry) receives his Military Medal for bravery at a ceremonial parade held at Harrowby Camp in 1919 shortly before his discharge from the army. His VC was awarded at Buckingham Palace by George V.

We will be delighted to include their details in the book we plan to write when our research is completed. We are interested in all who served in any way and whether at home or in any theatre of war. Please help us to build a comprehensive, accurate picture of Shipdham and its residents during that great period of change. We hope to hear from you.

#### **GARDENING NOTES**

Believe it or not Christmas is on the horizon, so if you have some good holly in your garden with berries, you might like to cut some now before the birds devour all the berries, (but leave some for them too!) and remember to keep birds' feeders and water topped up.

Now is a good time to trim your evergreen hedges and if you have hellebores which flower in the winter, cut off leaves to make space for the lovely flowers which will appear to brighten our winter.

If you like tulips it's time to plant them - hopefully somewhere where the muntjacs won't get them. They seem to be very partial to tulips!

Fruit trees such as apple and pear can be pruned through the winter months until about February.

November is a good time both to plant new and prune existing rose bushes in your garden. Prune out around a third of the bushes to stop wind rock. If planting new roses in your garden avoid any area where there has previously been a rose as this can cause roses to sicken. If any of your roses have had black spot this year clear up carefully around the base to help prevent contamination next year and don't compost rose leaves with black spot. Also don't compost apple or pear tree leaves affected by scab.

We have had more than our fair share of rain recently! Some of your containers may have become badly waterlogged and there may well be lots of wet weather to come, so now is the time to raise container bases off the ground to prevent yet more water-logging.

There's still time to put in winter bedding and plant hanging baskets. Pansies, violas and primulas are still readily available.

If you have a garden pond you can divide water lilies and other pond plants to increase your plants for next year.



#### **SHIPDHAM WIVES**

At the October meeting we had a very interesting and informative talk from Hazel Gillingham on The Quiet Suffragette - Millicent Garret Fawcett, born 11th June 1847 in Aldeburgh, Suffolk. Her father's family built what we know as Snape Maltings. She was the eighth child of ten! She was encouraged to read, and speak her mind and took a keen interest in her father's political interests. Millicent's sister, Elizabeth Garrett Anderson who became Britain's first female doctor introduced her to Emily Davies, a suffragette.

When she was 12, Millicent was sent to London with her sister, Elizabeth, to a private boarding school. She attended many lectures and at one in particular she met John Stuart Mill who introduced her to other women's rights activists including Henry Fawcett, a Liberal MP whom she married in 1867. They had one child. In 1868 Millicent joined the London Suffragette Committee and in 1869 spoke at the first public pro-suffrage meeting. She wrote many publications and in 1875 she co-founded Newman Hall.

After her husband died she continued to campaign. She became leader of the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies, distancing herself from the militancy of the other party run by the Pankhursts. Millicent backed countless campaigns over the years. She continued to campaign for the vote during World War I emphasising how women helped the war effort.

In 1925 Millicent was appointed Dame Grand Cross of the Order of the British Empire. Millicent Fawcett Hall was built in 1929 In Westminster as a place for women's debates and discussions.


In 2018, one hundred years after the passing of the Representation of the People Act, for which she had successfully campaigned, she became the first woman to be commemorated with a statue in Parliament Square. So, it's a good time to try us out and see if our mixture of talks, visits, social events and shows suits you.



Highlights from the Parish Council meeting on 9th October at WI Hall. Full minutes are available online once approved:

- Welcomed and co-opted Helen Cramp back onto Parish Council. Declaration of Acceptance of Office signed.
- Minutes of 11th September 2023 agreed unanimously and signed.
- Chairman's Actions: Gave a Heritage Centre update now opening 11am-2pm; Will close over the winter (19th November until 7th April); All exhibits will be placed in storage during closure.
- District Councillors Report: Cllr Turner raised the Local Plan consultation events, with details given out and placed in noticeboards.
- Parishioners' questions: Head of Thomas Bullock School updated on RAAC. The whole school had been surveyed and it was only found in main hall. They had been able to work around this. Repair tender process in hand for works to be carried out before winter time.

Questions included: Hedging at Golden Dog, 23-25 Pound Green Lane and Watton Road allotments; Missing bench at Eastgate; Bus shelter cleaning; Cemetery grass cutting; Trees on Park Estate.

- Village finances approved and agreed.
- Quarter 2 budget report noted.
- Comments on planning applications received. Planning decisions noted.
- Cllr Turner had visited Old Coal Yard site with BDC; Confirmed no more building this year due to nutrient neutrality; Site looking disgraceful so have contacted Places for People and Bowbridge Homes to tidy; BDC will enforce if no efforts made.
- Clerk Report: Received and noted.
- BPMC: New benches ordered (in memory of Roger (Claude) Knights and Mr Park Highatt; New heating system to be installed during half-term week; Park event, similar to "Tea in the Park", to be organised for Bank Holiday (21st July 2024); Health & Safety update: matting under roundabout in hand.
- Highways Issues: Untaxed car with no MoT parked in Pound Green Lane for over a year. Clerk to contact Parking Services, Kings Lynn, the SPC to do tort is no action taken.
- Parking Issues: Parking around school unless someone is breaking the law, the Police will not get involved. Clerk to invite Parking Services to visit.
- Christmas Tree: Approved. Clerk to order and contact Community Hub re delivery.
- DBS checks: Approved but not mandatory. Clerk to register and do checks for those wishing to have one.

(Cllr Chubbock). The Parish Council wished Paul Chubbock a speedy recovery. Next meeting planned for **Monday 13th November 2023**, 7:30pm in the WI Hall. We look forward to seeing everyone who can make it!

#### Cemetery

In order for the Council to safely maintain the Cemetery with dignity and respect we would ask that the following regulations are adhered to.

Two vases are allowed at the head on any one grave. No other adornments or perishable items such as shrubs or trees, artificial flowers, wooden fencing, concrete or other kerbing, wire fencing, windmills, raised or sunken footstones, solar lights, wind chimes, balloons, items made of tin/plastic/glass/brick or any other similar items as determined by the Council are allowed. The Council may remove any adornments without notice if deemed unsuitable and dead flowers, wreaths and other perishable items will be removed to keep the cemetery clean and tidy by an agent of the Council.
